

GATLIFF, V. H. (D.S.O.)

Vivian Harold Gatliff was one of five sons of John Henry Gatliff (1848-1935) and Emma (née McLean) (1859-1948) who enlisted in the AIF and who are listed on the St Jude's Honour Board. The large and well-respected family lived above the Commercial Bank of Australia premises at 259-261 Lygon Street from 1895 until 1910, while J. H. Gatliff was Bank Manager.

Harold, as he was known, married Frances Dorothy Joan Brodrick in 1922 and the couple moved to Oakleigh. Later they lived in East Malvern. Between the wars, he held a number of senior artillery command appointments in the Citizens Military Force (CMF). During World War II, he served as Commander Royal Artillery, 4th Australian Infantry Division and then Commanding Officer Coast & Anti-Aircraft Defences, Victoria Lines of Communication Area. He was transferred to the Reserve of Officers 6 March 1943 with the honorary rank of Brigadier. V.H. Gatliff died in 1963.

Both of the Gatliff brothers from Croxton, Vic, enlisted in August 1914. The family also had three other brothers serving with the AIF. Maj Vivian Gatliff was later awarded DSO in 1917 and went on to serve as a Brigadier in the Second World War. An elder brother Charles Edwin Gatliff had served in the Boer War prior to serving in the First World War.
