Thomas Frederick Robert Fynmore was born in Geelong in 1889 to Thomas Edward Fynmore (ca.1833-1896) and Elizabeth Whan (1867-1946). He came from a large and distinguished British naval family.

His great-grandfather Captain James Fynmore (ca.1763-1824) fought in the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805 as did his grandfather, James Francis Fynmore (1793-1887) (later Lieutenant Colonel J F Fynmore). Many of their descendants settled in Australia and New Zealand and all seven of the Fynmore men who served in the First AIF were related.

Thomas's younger brother James Fynmore also enlisted in the AIF and served overseas. He too is listed on the St Jude's Honour Roll together with their cousin Frederick Augustus Collingwood Fynmore.

Tom married Elsie Daniel on his return in 1919 and the couple went on to have two children.

'Near LAGNICOURT on the evening of

Lance Corporal FYNMORE went out, dressed the man's wounds, carried him to a place of safety and personally delivered the despatches to their destination. He then procured assistance and a stretcher and returned for the patient and carried him to the Field Ambulance, a distance of two

miles.'

MILITARY MEDAL WON

News has been received by Miss Elsia Daniel, of Airlie Ludies' College. Clifton Hill, that Lance-Corporal Thomas Pynmore, of the Army Medical Corps, has won the Military Medal.

Relating his experiences, he writes:—"One morning the Germans flew over our trenches, and took a photograph. That evening they fired on as, hitting the despatch rider and there N.C.O.'s. I ran and dressed their wounds under shell fre. The despatch rider being the most critical case, I carried him into the dug-out, and while attending to most critical case. I carried him into the duc-out, and while attending to his wounds a shell exploded, the next dug-out to ours being blown to pieces. At the time I thought we would never see daylight again; but, thanks to the old field-cooker, it saved out lives.

'After I had got the aid of three men we carried our hero to the nearest dressing station, which was

nearest dressing station, which was three miles away. The next thing to consider was the despatches, so I delivered them without further trupble."

Lance-Corporal Thomas Fynmore is 26 years of age.



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
