

KLUGLEIN, C. H.

Carl Herman (or Hermann) Kluglein was born in New Zealand in 1894 and travelled to Australia with his family on the ship *Talune*, arriving in April 1901.

By 1907, they were living at *Makarewa*, 450 Madeline Street, Carlton where his father, Carl Heinrich/Henry, died.

Carl enlisted in 1914, the same year his mother married Fredrick Winneke.

In less than a year, he was killed in action at Gallipoli. He wrote his will en route to battle and named Miss Essie Fraser of Newmarket as his beneficiary. As his next of kin, his mother was the person who received his medals and other commemorations.

Commemoration details	The Lone Pine Memorial (Panel 25), Gallipoli, Turkey The Lone Pine Memorial, situated in the Lone Pine Cemetery at Anzac, is the main Australian Memorial on Gallipoli, and one of four memorials to men of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force. Designed by Sir John Burnet, the principal architect of the Gallipoli cemeteries, it is a thick tapering pylon 14.3 metres high on a square base 12.98 metres wide. It is constructed from limestone mined at Ilgardere in Turkey. The Memorial commemorates the 3268 Australians and 456 New Zealanders who have no known grave and the 960 Australians and 252 New Zealanders who were buried at sea after evacuation through wounds or disease. The names of

New Zealanders commemorated are inscribed on stone panels mounted on the south and north sides of the pylon, while those of the Australians are listed on a long wall of panels in front of the pylon and to either side. Names are arranged by unit and rank.

The Memorial stands over the centre of the Turkish trenches and tunnels which were the scene of heavy fighting during the August offensive. Most cemeteries on Gallipoli contain relatively few marked graves, and the majority of Australians killed on Gallipoli are commemorated here.

Captain C. H. Kluglein,
(killed in action) was born at Makarewa,
New Zealand, in 1894, and has been a well
known resident of Carlton for fifteen years,
being associated with St. Jude's Church of
England, Carlton. He was also a member of
the Melbourne Harriers, and was employed
for five years by the Colonial Mutual In-
surance Co. Ltd. He enlisted on the first
intimation of war being declared.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE CORPORAL KLUGLEIN.

Corporal Kluglein was appointed Lieutenant when we were deprived of his comradeship. He was killed at Cape Helles on the 8th May; a bullet shot him through the breast and he died immediately. He was a fine soldier, courageous in bearership, considerate of his men, commanding the confidence of his comrades. We regret his loss so soon, after gaining his well merited promotion yet that promotion should be a source of comfort to you for it speaks of his efficiency and high esteem in which he was held by those best able to appreciate his work. I count it an honor to have been associated with him, the fact that he fell while doing his duty. He was buried about three miles from the W. Beach.

May your sense of present loss be tempered by the certitude of future and permanent gain when war partings shall be o'er. May God of all comfort console and sustain you in your time of trial.
